A Gift of Spiritual Legacy

The greatest gift a mother can give her children is her example of love and obedience to God. Our sons and daughters need to see godly precepts lived out each day in our words and choices, since we are their first spiritual teachers and advisors. Each child comes into the world with a moldable mind. As we teach and model godly conduct, attitudes, and words, a belief system bent toward God can develop within them. It's like a sieve that filters everything coming into the mind. A child who has been prayed over and taught God's ways is more likely to see the world from a biblical perspective. But one who's been programmed by secular culture, or another religion, will view life through a distorted lens.

Pastors and Sunday school teachers can help in this process of training a child to know and love the Lord. However, it is primarily the responsibility of parents to invest whatever time, patience, instruction, and love are necessary to grow boys and girls into godly men and women.

Sending a child into the world without a biblical foundation is like throwing him into a lion's den without weapons or armor. Since children cannot discern truth from error, parents must guard young minds against the world's onslaught until they are ready to take over the challenge themselves.

The training of children is carried out through the daily activities of life. Use every opportunity to teach them about the Lord and His Word and show them what a righteous life looks like by living one. In other words, be the kind of believer that you hope your child will become.

Passing down your legacy of faith is the most valuable gift you can give your children.

Paul admired the faith heritage that was passed down to Timothy by his mother and grandmother. Although Eunice and Lois could not bestow salvation on Timothy, they modeled their faith in God and His Word. Timothy's greatest inheritance was spiritual instruction and godly examples from these influential women. Parents who desire to pass along a faith legacy need to make the following values part of their life:

- *Principles:* Know and practice biblical principles.
- Pattern: Apply scriptural principles to your live and live them out in front of your children. A consistent pattern of obedience to God inspires children to seek Him.
- Persistence: Never give up in your attempts to impart spiritual knowledge. It's never too late to begin
 crafting a faith heritage. Like
 Timothy's mother and
 grandmother, let's not settle for
 merely raising our children to
 adulthood. Instead, our goal should
 be to become godly examples who
 inspire and teach them to love and
 follow Jesus.

UNITY SERVICE AND ANNUAL BOARD MEETING


There will be a Unity Service on Sunday, May 29 at 10:15 a.m. Please note that there will be no service on Saturday, May 28.



Large Print Bibles and Devotionals



Did you know that Abiding Savior supports the Lutheran Braille Workers in their ministry of proclaiming God's Word throughout the country and the world?

On the second floor of Building C in Room 200, there is a Large Print Work Center that produces six different publications every month for distribution. This center is operated by a handful of volunteers (newcomers welcome) who meet Monday through Thursday mornings, printing, binding and mailing two different forms of the Bible, a complete Bible and the Lutheran Service Book specifically for prisons as well as two different monthly devotionals. Their output amounts to more than 100,000 pages a month. These publications are provided at no cost to the recipients. They are also available to you. From the Kitchen



Celebrate Mom this Mother's Day with this homemade breakfast casserole to start the morning off right.

CROISSANT BREAKFAST CASSEROLE

- 2 (5-oz.) country ham steaks, trimmed, bone discarded 2 tablespoons olive oil, divided
- 1 ½ pounds Vidalia onions or other sweet onions (2 medium onions), chopped (4 cups)
- 3 ounces baby spinach, roughly chopped (3 cups)
- 6 large eggs
- 2 cups whole milk
- 2 teaspoons Dijon mustard
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1 teaspoon black pepper
- 6 ounces fontina cheese,
- shredded (about 1 1/2 cups), divided
- 1 pound (about 15) day-old mini croissants

Directions:

1. Coarsely chop ham. (You should have 1 ½ cups.) Heat 1 tablespoon of the oil in a large skillet over medium. Add ham; cook, stirring occasionally, until fat is rendered, about 4 minutes. Using a slotted spoon, transfer ham to a large bowl, reserving drippings in skillet. Add remaining 1 tablespoon oil to skillet; stir in onions. Cook, stirring occasionally, until deeply browned, about 30 minutes. Add spinach; cook, stirring often, until wilted, 1 to 2 minutes. Transfer onion mixture to bowl with ham; let cool 10 minutes.

- Whisk together eggs, milk, mustard, salt, and pepper. Add egg mixture and 1 cup of the cheese to bowl with onion mixture and stir to combine. Arrange croissants, slightly overlapping, in 2 rows in a lightly greased 11x7 baking dish. Pour mixture over croissants. Sprinkle with remaining ½ cup cheese. Cover with aluminum foil, and chill 8 hours or up to overnight.
- Preheat oven to 375°F. Uncover casserole, and place on a large, rimmed baking sheet. Bake in preheated oven until golden brown and center is set, about 1 hour. Shield with foil after 25 minutes, if needed to prevent excess browning.

Sharing God's Word With People Who Are Blind Or Visually Impaired: Bringing Christ To The Nations



"I know when I read Jesus' name because I can feel His love travel up my arm and to my heart," says Tim, a 13-year-old from India.

"I was born blind and have never seen a person's face, not even my own parents' faces. But now I know, when I get to heaven, Jesus is the first face I will see," says Lucy, a 14-year-old from Mexico.

Working with individual Christians, congregations, and likeminded organizations are vital to expanding ministry. They allow Lutheran Hour Ministries to share the Gospel around the world with all who need to hear it by widening the networks through which we can share our programs and resources.

One of these ongoing relationships is with Lutheran Braille Workers (LBW), an organization founded in 1943 in response to a shortage of Braille Bibles for blind pastors in Germany. What initially was thought to be a one-off request for the development of a single German Braille Bible has turned into the world's largest non-profit producer of Braille, specialized large print, and audio Christian materials.

When LBW founder Helene Loewe Koehler received a letter from someone who had benefitted from the initial German Braille Bible, she wrote in her journal, "I think about how much time and effort went into producing one Braille Bible. How in the world can we keep up with demand? But if people are asking for the Gospel, how can we ever say no?" Through the creation of a modern Braille press and the support of family and friends, local Ladies Aid Societies, and volunteers from various Lutheran churches, Koehler began expanding production of materials into other languages and titles. As production grew, demand also grew. Several years later, through the encouragement of The Lutheran Hour Speaker at the time, Rev. Dr. Oswald Hoffmann, Koehler expanded into large print production.

LBW currently produces approximately 150,000 volumes a year through the dedication of 3,000 volunteers in 115 production centers throughout the United States. To date, LBW has shipped more than 15 million volumes and millions of other pamphlets, calendars, and other materials, in almost 40 languages, to 164 countries. Thanks to the generosity of their volunteers and donors, every single volume of material has been distributed free of chargeleading to millions of people being reached with the Gospel through their efforts.

"Our mission is to provide all people in the world who are blind or visually impaired with free access to the Good News of Jesus Christ," says LBW Vice President of Ministry Advancement Daniel Jenkins. More than 253 million people today are blind or visually impaired, of which 241 million of them are unchurched. This makes our materials a great resource for individuals who are often disconnected from God's Word.

Jenkins adds, "Our longstanding association with Lutheran Hour Ministries is extremely valuable since there is a close alignment between our organizations in wanting to share the Word of God with people in ways they can understand without it being a financial burden."

One of the popular LHM resources available through LBW are the weekly sermons from The Lutheran Hour. LBW began producing the sermons in Braille in 1951 and today produces and distributes almost 8,000 Braille sermons each month. One recipient from England wrote, "You have been supplying me with wonderful Braille materials for more than twenty years and I have used them to spread the story of God's love. Now my wife has gone to be with Jesus, and I am eighty years old, but that's not too old to work for the Lord. Moses started his work at eighty and Aaron at eighty-three, so I will keep working if you keep supplying. God bless you for making this possible."

In 1959, LBW expanded into large print production due to the substantial number of requests that LHM was receiving from elderly listeners who had poor vision but did not read Braille. These efforts continue today with more than 12,000 specialized large print sermons of The Lutheran Hour being produced and shipped each month on 14-point, glare reducing paper.

The Lutheran Hour sermons transcribed to Braille or available in large print are not only requested by individuals of all ages, but are often used by orphanages, schools, and churches around the world as Bible studies or worship services for people who are blind or visually impaired.

Other popular LHM resources offered by LBW are the library of Project Connect booklets in Braille, large print, and audio and The Journey Home Bible study lessons available in large print for prison inmates. LBW is also working with LHM to offer the seasonal devotions for Advent and Lent from the past five years.

"We are grateful for this ongoing relationship with LHM and look forward to exploring additional opportunities for working together to share the Gospel with even more people who are blind or visually impaired," says Jenkins.


FINAL DETAILS FOR THE 2023 LHMFC ROSE PARADE FLOAT

• Hiring a new teacher and preparing to open the nursery as a sixth classroom in the fall of 2022.

• Winning the Orange County Parenting Magazine Award for Best Faith Based School.

• Updating our facility with roman shades, a new water heater, pour in place ground covering, additional lighting, and replenishing our wood chips.

Our Sunday School children experienced the Easter tradition of celebrating new life via an Easter Egg Hunt. More importantly, they read, watched, and solved (a jigsaw puzzle) the glorious narrative of the resurrection of Jesus.

The lies and inconsistent reports of Jesus in the kangaroo court by Jesus' accusers during His trial were mimicked by the children. Whispering a sentence to a child it would be whispered to another, and another. The sentence stated by the last child did not match the original. Just like made-up accusations at the trial, a student announced three things about themselves...two were true, one a falsehood. Example: Favorite animal of one of the girls was an elephant. True or false? TRUE!

The lessons before the glorious resurrection were sad and dark in the life of Christ. The children heard in a video that the grounds considered by Biblical scholars to be the Garden of Gethsemane contain olive trees that were there at the time of Christ. "Why did the disciple cut off the ear of the soldier," one inquisitive boy asked. Children began to assemble a storybook containing, in chronological order, the events in the Garden and the arrest.

What would you serve Jesus if He came to your house for dinner? The item that probably garnered the most choices was...pizza! For a hands-on experience regarding the lesson on the Last Supper the children got to see and feel a real Communion wafer (not one from the altar). Some were curious about the impression on the wafer and how it tasted.


